Christmas Good News in Troubling Times (Isa. 9:6)

Introduction: Today, we are celebrating the Advent candle of "Hope" – which celebrates the prophecy the coming Messiah!

The Old Testament is full of prophecies about the coming Messiah. Our text today is only one of them – but it illustrates the great hope we have in Christ's coming!

I. Our hope is centered in a Wonderful Counselor:

- **A. Isaiah lived in a time of national turmoil -** Assyria, a new and rising world power had already threatened Judah.
- 1. Israel, the Northern kingdom was already gone crushed by the Assyrians.
- 2. Yet in this dark time Isaiah saw a glimmer of hope! (He prophesied about it (Isa. 9:2).
- **B.** Isaiah then gives a strange prophecy about a child being born (v.6) Isaiah's faith in God sees the child as if He were already there.
- 1. Doesn't it seem hollow sometimes when people encourage you with words...
- 2. But it is this faith in dark times that bring to light this truth and gives us real hope! (Prov. 12:26; Mt. 6:27f.; Phil. 4:6; Ps. 37:5-7; 1 Pe. 5:7)

C. Isaiah announces God has the answers to Judah's troubles

- 1. His title shall be wonderful, counselor –
- 2. Isaiah says God's solution to our deepest darkest times is Jesus, the wonderful counselor (Col.2:3)
- II. Our hope is centered in a Mighty God:

What gives us such hope is not just the wisdom of this wonderful counselor, but

- A. Our hope comes from knowing our counselor is "Mighty God!" -
- 1. Isaiah did not just see his hope coming from God his hope came seeing his help was Almighty God! (Ps. 9:9; 23:4; 27:1,5; 28:7; 118:6-9; 121:2; Rom.8:31)

- 2. Some have said there is no way Isaiah could have conceived in his mind the incarnation of Christ that he prophesied about here -(2 Tim.3:16)
- **B.** Today, we see How God brought all this about Maybe you don't know how God is going to work all your stuff out, but you know His word says (Eph 3:20; Mt. 19:26).
- **III. Our hope is centered in an <u>Everlasting Father</u>: We have all seen leaders come and go the good never lasts.**
 - A. Isaiah says, "Yes, but to this king's reign there will be no end!"
 - 1. "Where is God in the midst of all the evil and tragedy in the world today?" (Ps. 102:26,27; Mal. 3:6a; Js. 1:17)
 - 2. Our hope is centered on the fact that we have an everlasting Father who is the same yesterday, today and forever!

B. Isaiah calls Him "Father" -

- 1. God is the creator of every man, but He is not the Father of every man. (Jn.1:12)
- 2. But to those who have become the children of God –(Mt. 7:11)
- IV. Our hope is centered in a <u>Prince</u> of <u>Peace</u>: This was a dark time in Judah. But it was to this time, Isaiah spoke of God's "Prince of peace!"
 - A. The ways of this world are difficulty, unrest and troublesome (Jb. 5:7; 14:1; Eccl. 5:17; 2:23)
 - **B.** This peace does not mean the absence of conflict; but rather peace in the midst of conflict.
 - 1. Just following Jesus does not mean all your troubles are over or guarantee us peace (Mt. 10:22,34)
 - 2. Jesus gives us a peace not as the world gives, but He gives to us perfect peace (Rom. 5:1; Jn. 14:27; Phil. 4:7; Jn. 16:33)

Conclusion: It is this peace even in the midst of trouble and turmoil that gives us that ray of hope that drives a way the shadows of fear and frustration! Let this Christmas be a celebration of the hope that comes because Jesus came!
